Hello from the mountains of Montana and welcome to the Hellgate Mineral Society (HMS) Annual Gem and Mineral Show, the Treasures of the Northwest, and the 2026 Northwest Federation of Mineralogical Societies (MFMS) Convention. The show is set for Saturday and Sunday, March 21-22, 2026.

The show is being held at the Hilton Garden Inn, 3720 N Reserve St, Missoula, MT 59808, Phone (406) 532-5300. The Hilton Garden has set aside ten rooms for NFMS members and vendors on a first come, first served basis.

Daily admission is \$5.00 per person, with children under 12 free when accompanied by a paying adult. The show will be offering exhibitions on wire wrapping, flint knapping, silver smithing, gold panning, and fossil prepping. Fun activities include raffles for rock-hounding paraphernalia, hourly door prizes of vendor-donated gems and minerals, the sale of grab bags of rock and mineral specimens, a silent auction, and a Spin-to-Win. Fun activities for the younger crowd include a mineral dig, geode cracking and a kids-only silent auction.

As the show is in March, and the show is in Missoula, the ability to have field trips is sharply curtailed. So, new this year, we are offering the opportunity participate in “onsite field trips” where attendees can sift for sapphires, sift for garnets, sift for sunstones, and pan for gold.

The HMS show is hosting eighteen vendors. There are also three club tables with six club members (three on Saturday and three on Sunday) displaying and selling their wares.

FB Chronicles of the Rockhound Retreat by Rhea Bowerly (printed here with her permission)**September 1**

Off for an adventure in Central Oregon. Headed to Hancock Rockhound Retreat to learn how to do more things with rocks!!! Well I made it down to John Day Fossil Beds. First I was out in the middle of nowhere driving thru rolling hills of golden wheat. Then I was winding thru basalt columned walls and Boy was it curvy with hairpin turns! It was 100 degrees when we were dragging all our stuff to the cabins!

It's 77 now and everyone else went to bed so I'm sitting outside in my chair alone, enjoying a light breeze, looking at millions of stars and watching for a chance to see the Northern Lights. Supposedly they might make an appearance tonight. There are lots of bats flying around and I used my UV light and found 6 scorpions, 4 of which were outside my cabin! Tomorrow we start our classes. I'll start with "doublets and triplets" then move on to Wire wrapping. Lots of nice people here and we ALL LOVE ROCKS!

September 2

Day 2 of the retreat was busy and HOT HOT HOT!!! Imagine 104 degrees and NO air conditioning!

I bought all these rechargeable fans you can wrap around your neck and sit on the table. They're supposed to last 8 hrs and I got maybe 2 hrs out of them! Not much help! I'm lying outside again tonight enjoying a breeze and watching satellites and airplanes cross the skies. I wire wrapped one of the cabs I made and I think it came out nice. I used copper wire on my pendant so I decided to do a chain to match. So I moved over to the "chainmail" class and got started on that. It's going to take some time to finish that. Working with all those little "rings" are hard on my eyes and feeble fingers!

The moon was cool tonight but I just couldn't get the rainbow rings around it to show up in pictures! I did get a couple good shots though!

September 3

Hancock Camp Day 3 Today was a little cooler. Like 2 degrees cooler but it didn't feel as bad as yesterday. Finished my chain for my pendant! What a relief! I forgot to take a picture of it until after dark. I improvised and put in on my lawnchair with a flashlight as a spot light! I'll take a better one tomorrow. But at least you can see the chain. Found an interesting thing today while exploring the camp. A full sized skeleton of a horse! It even had an old saddle on it. That's not something you run into every day! We played rock Bingo tonight and I didn't win once but the s'mores made up for it! I drowned my disappointment in chocolate and marshmallows!!! Worked on some other things that I'm really excited about but you'll have to wait til tomorrow night to see them!

Was a little startled to see the scorpions (which are apparently territorial since they stay in the same area every night) but 2 of them had moved down into the path where I was walking! (Still wearing flip flops!) It's so cool to see them with the UV light, otherwise you'd never even notice them! The moon is so beautiful every night and it's so peaceful here.

September 4

Hancock Day 4...I had a productive day. Started with wire wrapping another stone. It's called "Rolling Hills Dolomite" and I had made it a few years ago. I have so many cabs that I have made that it's hard to choose which ones to wrap. I finished my "doublet" which I'm calling "Jellyfish agate". And my "Triplet" that the bottom layer is Basenite, then a thin layer of opal capped with a layer of Optical Quartz. I was working on a couple of amazing pieces of Rainbow Obsidian but one went flying while I was on the final polish and broke into pieces! The other piece will have to wait until tomorrow. (If we're still here)!

So far we have moved everything we don't need for tonight to our cars. It's required we back in our vehicles for a Fast getaway! I'm outside and I can't even smell any smoke. The moon is playing hide and seek but I got a couple of cool pictures. We'll see what tomorrow brings!

Nature is throwing us a curve tonight. We've been told to pack up essentials and move them to our cars. There is a fire about 5 miles away over the hill so we have to be ready to evacuate! Supposedly it's moving to the North but you never know when the winds might shift! To be continued..

September 5

Day 5 of Hancock Rockhound Retreat...Well the Black Rock fire is still burning but hasn't gotten us yet. Went swimming in the John Day River today and the fire crews were filling their tankers from the river. We thanked them for their service and told them we were at a camp on the other side of the hill. He said the fire is still spreading but they would not let it cross the river. That made us feel better. But then tonight we had a banger of a thunderstorm with lots of lightning. It just poured rain which is unusual for this area which is basically desert! Hope it didn't start a new fire on OUR side of the river! I took a picture of the glow from the fire over the hill since the moon isn't making an appearance tonight!

Didn't have a productive day today. It was sooo hot and humid, over 100 again! Everything I worked on gave me problems. So some of us headed to the river. It felt SOOOO good! Tonight was the auction to raise money for the camp. They made \$3000 dollars. Not so bad for a bunch of crazy rock hounds. These people are ALL crazy about rocks and all the artistic things you can do with them!

September 6

No more days at Hancock camp the fire is coming our way and we've been evacuated!

UPDATE...I made it home about 9:30. Safe and sound!

September 7

So day 6 of the Hancock Rockhound Retreat started out great. We were gearing up for "Show and Tell" night where everyone displays the projects they've made in the past week. I finished 2 more pendants one with copper and the other with silver. (Will try to post a pic. later!)

Just as we were about to have dinner an ugly rumor raised its head. The fire had jumped the river! Just minutes later an official came and announced that the fire had indeed jumped the river and was headed towards our camp! Immediate evacuation was necessary! The air horn started blaring which was our signal for fire danger. Fortunately there was still time to collect our belongings! We had been told two evenings previously to load everything in our vehicles that wasn't crucial for that night. Just in case...So most of my stuff was already in my car. I made 2 quick trips with my sleeping bag, pillows and lawn chair, ran in and grabbed some watermelon for the road and was out of there in minutes. It was an interesting drive filled with lots of wildlife and beauty, a gorgeous sunset, with wheat fields, basalt cliffs, pheasant, rabbits, hawks and deer. Thankfully none of them were suicidal and didn't jump in front of my car! I took some amazing pictures on the way home. A beautiful ending to a fun week and scary situation. Hopefully the camp won't burn so I can go again next year!



WAMS Juniors have spent the months of June and July with an emphasis on the Fossils badge during their meetings (making casts and molds, tril-o-bite cookies) understanding how fossils are formed and a pretty good background on what is known of trilobites.

Also in June, 14 WAMS Juniors took a fieldtrip to Newport on the Oregon Coast, where they had the opportunity to meet with Kent Gibson, a nationally known fossil collector who has some of his incredible specimens on display in the Smithsonian Institution and other museums. 



Minutes of the Meeting.

Marcus Whitman Club House, September 5th, 2025, 1:20pm

Janel Lacey first took the microphone to welcome all to their clubhouse and the show.

Past NFMS Presidents attending were Bill Smith, Ronna Watkins, Darrell Coyle, Larry Hulstrom, Judi Allison, and Jennifer Haley.

Tony Fender, former California Federation President, current 3rd Vice President of AFMS and Sandie Fender, President of the AFMS Scholarship Committee are part of the Club at Large.

The Directors and Delegates present were Ed Moser, Owyhee; Debbie Mitchell, Idaho Gem; June Dorning, Yakima; Michelle Ernsberger, Golden Spike; Jim Brain, Club at Large; Anna McKinney, Marysville; Lynn and Michael Richards, Hellgate; Clara and Del Walker, Prineville; Brian Paleck, Clackamette; Bill and Janet Smith, Chugach; Jon Elmgren, Everett; Larry and Josh Hulstrom, Lakeside; Mary Lou and Jerry Northrup, Hells Canyon; Karli Cook, Hatrockhounds; Mike Marsh, Mt Baker; Janel Lacey, Marcus Whitman; Adam Pettitt, Willamette; Ronna Watkins, Yakima; Darrell Coyle, Bitterroot; Don Dixon, Owyhee.

After introductions and before we got down to business, we had a raffle drawing for a dinosaur bone donated by Jennifer Haley. Jon Elmgren was the lucky recipient.

As a final introduction Janel Lacey presented two of the Marcus Whitman volunteers who had been instrumental in helping the show be a success: Kathy Lynch and Sara Carlson.

Invocation for a productive meeting and the wellbeing and safety of our attendees was delivered by our Pastor/Parliamentarian **Evan Day**.

Lora Hall then called for a **Moment of Silence** to honor who have passed in the last year.

Credentials reported there were 23 representatives from 16 clubs with credentials. Clara Walker moved to accept the additional uncredentialed individuals with a second from Darrell Coyle. Motion carried. With the additional representatives, there were 27 Directors and Delegates representing 19 clubs.

President, Lora Hall thanked all the attendees then asked for **committee reports. Most were in the packet.**

***Michael Rhodes, as Budget Chair**, pointed out there was a mistake in his proposed budget. The revenue line items referring to Junior interest amounts need to be moved up one. The Junior CD should be read at \$600 and the Junior Savings \$2 with the next item blank.

***Custodian, Jennifer Haley** added that the T-shirts and hats that have been in the supplies for a long period were donated to the Juniors Program for prizes or whatever they deemed appropriate. "Under the Past Presidents Council- this committee no longer has the supplies listed as written in the report. All of the t-shirts, caps, were given to the Juniors committee at the Billings Show in 2024 to be used as additional rewards for juniors. Past NFMS Show pins will be given to their appropriate clubs. It is unknown where the 4-drawer file cabinet is.

***Jim Brain** reported that the **Endowment** ended the current year a little better than what was shown in the report.

Information from the AFMS Committee representatives

***The ALAA** report was available **on the back table**.

***Incoming AFMS President, Ronna Watkins**, mentioned the **AFMS Show and Convention** will be held in **St Charles, Illinois May 23-26** and that the **AFMS newsletter** will be going digital in February.

AFMS President, JC Moore added that the Convention was being hosted by the Midwest Federation. It will be a fantastic show with camping facilities and a time for wholesale as well as retail sales. The show committee is working on the possibility of getting admission into the Lizzadro Museum of Lapidary Arts at no charge,

***Judi Allison** stated that the prizes for the **AFMS Endowment Fund** are just being gathered. She will have tickets for purchase at the Annual meeting in Missoula in March.

Lora Hall stated that there are **new Junior Clubs** joining from all the Federations, although we **need to get NFMS clubs enrolled**. Jennifer Fitch, NFMS Chair, was unable to attend, so there will not be a Junior leader meeting on Sunday.

Old Business

Judi Allison did a poorly executed literal song and dance **plea for a Treasurer**. She stated she is willing to continue collecting the dues. Lora added a more serious plea. (Between this plea and additional song and dance at the banquet, we may have success. Keep your fingers crossed and look for further developments.) I don't want to jinx anything, so hold tight on that thought. Judi

New Business

***Central Montana Prospectors** paid their dues after the cutoff time and **Malheur County Rock and Gem Club** sent their dues to rejoin the Federation. They had previously been members before COVID. Bill Smith moved to **accept both clubs for full membership**. Clara Walker seconded the motion. Motion carried by unanimous vote.

***Michael Rhodes** created a motion to accept the **proposed budget with the ability to move funds within its boundaries as needed**. Larry Hulstrom seconded the motion. **Motion passed by a show of paddles**.

***Jim Brain** took the floor to **discuss possibilities for utilizing expendable funds from the Endowment Fund**. He stated that the committee has been attempting for a period of time to get input from the membership. In essence, the proposals he will bring forth are from the Executive Board and Committee members. Since we are a 501C3 there are some rules from the articles of incorporation. Since we are a nonprofit charitable group, we should be showing how we give back. He stated there is "not much charitable going on." Speakers and lectures at shows and other events such as meetings and banquets are starting to lack. We can make donations to grants through the Federation. We need to do things that will improve involvement in the Federation. Following are numerous suggestions and ideas.

-Monetary awards for miscellaneous activities such as participation in exhibiting, entry into the Bulletin Aids Contests, creation of an All-American booklet, etc.

-Club liability policy-pay or reduced rate. (Anna McKinney pointed out that rules may vary from state to state. Janel Lacey suggested allocation of a percentage to each club.)

-Canned programs or You Tube presentations to be used at any level of presentation in the Federation

-How-to videos: maybe students could develop-give a grant for the development

-Donations to non-profit museums such as Rice Museum in exchange for free admission. (Anna McKinney pointed out that some clubs do not issue membership cards. How would membership be verified? The suggestion was that the museum could have a club roster at its disposal.

Lora Hall suggested members look through the list. Remember someone needs to be willing to do the leg work. Bill Smith said he will bring the suggestions to his club. Michelle Ernsberger stated it needs to be at the club level-grass roots.

Additional Suggestions:

-Peterson Rock Garden out of Redmond, Oregon is attempting to refurbish and upgrade from the deterioration it has suffered over the years. The Prineville Pow Wow donated \$9000 to help with the restoration. A grant of \$5000 from the Federation was a suggestion.

-Also, \$1.00 dues reduction. Jim doesn't like this because last time we were locked in for five years without the ability to utilize funds for anything else.

Anna McKinney stated she is willing to **create a Google survey** so the data gathered can be put into a spreadsheet **showing preferences throughout the Federation**. It was agreed that this could be a very useful informative tool. She will create one with the various suggestions given above. **Secretary Judi Allison** will then **send the survey to Directors and Newsletter recipients** to have them follow through with their respective clubs.

Janel Lacey stated that as **Directory Chair**, as **deadlines** for various things approach, (for example: time to turn in submissions for the Bulletin Aids Contest, time to submit applications for the Junior Achievement Awards, deadline to submit for the All-American Award, etc.)she is willing to **send out a notice**. In so doing, perhaps we can garner more entries into these various contests and awards.

Jim then related a story about how he was a member when the original purchase of the Marcus Whitman Clubhouse was signed, as he in fact signed it. He admitted that at the time he was a Doubting Thomas, but he watched the transformation and is very pleasantly surprised by the outcome.

Darrell Coyle introduced the **slate of nominees** as was outlined in the agenda. He then brought to attention that our 1st Vice President candidate, Jennifer Haley has moved back to Northern California, although she is an NFMS member through the Club at Large. He moved that the exception of her being out of boundaries be waived so that she may serve through the officer positions. Jerry Northrup seconded the motion. Motion passed with a show of paddles. Bill Smith then **moved to accept the slate of nominees as the official inductees. This was accepted by the voting membership.**

As Parliamentarian, Evan Day explained that as the Head of the Bylaw Revisory Committee Darrell Coyle cannot vote on a proposal, but he will present his report, then “change hats” and as a club member of the Bitterroot Gem and Mineral Society, will present a proposal for voting purposes.

Darrell then took the floor and offered information as the **Revisory Committee Chair**. He asked that the **changes** brought forward be **voted on as a whole**. The committee asked for additional input and added and corrected as the revisions took place. He pointed out that the administrative dates have already been changed to September 5 instead of the 12th. After asking if there were any questions regarding the proposal packed and receiving none, he stated there was one change to add to the packet under Meetings, Section 8, Delete “but not vote”.

As **director for Bitterroot Darrell then moved to accept the Bylaw revision packet**. Brian Paleck seconded the motion. The proposal passed by a vote of the Assembly.

A **proposed addition** to the Bylaws was brought forward from the **Golden Spike Gem and Mineral Society as a Friendly Amendment**. Michael Rhodes presented the amendment as a member of Golden Spike stating that it had been brought before the Chair of the Bylaws Revisory committee (Darrell) with no objections, so he turned it back over to Darrell. Darrell then moved to accept the Amendment with a second from Anna McKinney. **Accepted.**

The matter of the **Operation Procedures** was then brought up. Darrell has been working on revisions that align with the proposed Bylaw changes. He has added Parliamentarian duties, Long Range Planning and Operations Review. He requested to delete “no person can serve more than one term as President” and change it to two. Anna McKinney asked why not three years or such. Darrell explained that one could make a motion if necessary to waive the exception. Jim Brain commented that they found that they had to work backward for revisions and with such were able to wade through the bulk of the job.

Bill Smith moved to accept the Operation Procedure changes and Jerry Northrup seconded it. **The changes were approved with a show of paddles and the motion carried.**

Lora thanked the Directors and Delegates with Thank You! Thank You! Thank You!

Larry Hulstrom presented the proposal from the **Hellgate Mineral Society of Missoula, Montana to host the 2026 show March 21-22**. It will again be a two-day show with **meetings on the 20th**. Bill Smith moved to accept the proposal and Anna McKinney seconded with a hardy acceptance to the plan.

Judi put in a plea for hosts for following years; 2027, 2028 and beyond. Please note we are working with clubs in any way we can to help make it easier to host a show.

Michael stated that with the Bylaw change, we will **now have a 16-month year for the period through December**. He is prepared to take over **the Presidential duties** through that period and continue through the fiscal and calendar year **at the end of 2026**. Ronna Watkins moved to accept this plan and Anna McKinney seconded the motion. With an agreement from all, the meeting was adjourned.
